The CLCPA's implementation roadmap is missing important details in a few key areas.

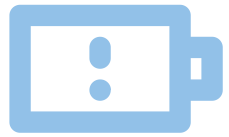


Cap & Invest

By raising the cost of business and worsening the state's already poor economic climate, New York is likely to drive existing industries out of state, and deter new industries from moving in.

Retire/repurpose fossil-fuel plants by 2040

NYISO has warned of declining margins of electric system reliability, creating risk of blackouts. As electric demand increases and the state increasingly depends on unreliable wind and solar, non-emitting but dispatchable backup sources will be necessary to keep the power on — but no such sources currently exist.

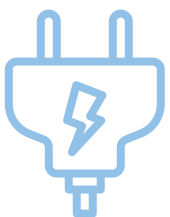


Building Mandates

The myriad expensive mandates include banning residential and commercial gas, propane, oil and hot water heaters and appliances and adopting energy-efficiency standards for buildings above 25,000 square feet.

Transition most residential, commercial, and industrial gas customers to electricity by 2050

No cost-benefit analysis has been done of this, or any of the other proposals, and so the cost to homeowners, landlords and commercial and industrial businesses has not been calculated.



Require new residential buildings be all electric

Deprives homeowners of choice, drives up building costs and prevents developers from making case-by-case decisions on the most cost-effective approach to housing development.
